



Commonly asked question

Is work an essential component of your studies?

Answer "No". Your program does not include a mandatory work placement. Your study permit allows you to work off campus up to 20 hours per week during studies if you are in a full-time program. A separate work permit is not required.





You must be a legal resident living in one of the following countries at the time of application to apply (not country of citizenship).

- Brazil
- China
- Colombia
- Costa Rica
- India
- Morocco
- Pakistan
- Peru
- Philippines
- Senegal
- Saint Vincent and the Grenadines
- Trinidad and Tobago
- Vietnam

Spouse/common-law partner and dependent children

You must complete and submit their applications at the same time as your own.

Required documents – Student Direct Stream (SDS)

Standard required documents:

- Application for Study Permit Made Outside of Canada (IMM1294)
- Letter of Acceptance and Visa Support Form from OCAD University
 - Combine both documents into one PDF and upload it in the "Letter of Acceptance" section of your online document checklist
- Upfront <u>immigration medical exam</u> (if you need one)
- Guarantee Investment Certificate (GIC) of \$10,000 CAD
 - Purchase from a participating Canadian financial institution
- Proof that tuition fees for the first year of study have been paid
 - Email <u>studentaccounts@ocadu.ca</u>. Our Student Accounts team can advise you on the process for paying fees and getting a receipt to use for your study permit application
 - Use the estimate amount on the visa support form from OCAD. Please note that your exact balance owing will be available in your OCAD U fees account
- Language test result that shows a score of 6.0 or higher in each skill (reading, writing, speaking, and listening) on the <u>International English Language Testing System</u> (IELTS)
- Your passport
- Digital photo
- Proof of financial support
- Biometrics

Tips for writing a study plan for your study permit application

When you apply for a study permit, you should write a Study Plan explaining why you wish to come to Canada to study. You should submit a 1 to 2 page study plan which answers the following questions and includes any other information relevant to the processing of your application.

1. Why do you wish to study in Canada in the program for which you have been accepted?

To answer this question, you will want to describe the reasons you want to study in Canada. What makes Canada so special to you? List some of the reasons you are interested in pursuing your chosen program in Canada. You may wish to explain how excited you are to experience this new country and its culture. If you have studied abroad before, you may wish to add how important international education is to you.

2. What is your overall educational goal?

Explain what you would like to achieve by studying in Canada, academically, professionally, and personally. Depending on your situation, you might be continuing your education directly after high school or looking to expand your knowledge with a master's degree. State the field of study that you are interested in and why you are choosing that field. State how continuing your education will further your career in your home country. You may want to do some research on the type of job you want after graduation and the requirements for the industry or field you plan to work in. Then you will know if your plans to continue your education meet up with your career goals. Explain why studying abroad in Canada will help you successfully reach your educational goals.

3. Why are you not pursuing a similar program in your country of residence or citizenship?

Canada's education system is well known and valued all over the world. Write about how you want to come to Canada to improve your education and continue learning by studying abroad. Maybe schools in your country do not offer the same courses/programs or are designed in different way, and you found a program that matches your learning style and preference for structure in the program in Canada. Maybe there are not many colleges or universities in your country that offer the programs you are interested in. Talk about the research you have done to see whether or not this specific program you are interested in is provided in your country or not and how it is the right fit for you.

4. How will this program enhance your employment opportunities in your country of residence or citizenship?

Discuss what job opportunities you have researched in your country of residence or citizenship. You may have found a job in your country that you are really interested in, but you do not have the required education to be able to obtain that specific job. Discuss how continuing your education in Canada will prepare you for such a position in your home country. If you know of a job in your country but you are unqualified, state how, after you get an education in Canada, you will be able to apply to this job when you return to your home country.

5. What ties do you have to your country of residence or citizenship?

Showing ties to your country of residence or citizenship is an important factor in a study permit application. An officer has to be convinced that you will leave Canada at the end of your authorized stay. Explain whether or not you have family in your home country or a third country outside of Canada. You should disclose if you have children, other family, and if you are married to someone in your country of residence. You can also mention your financial ties to your home country (like property or businesses that your parents own or if you have a potential job offer or employment opportunities, etc.

6. How do you plan to pay for your studies and living expenses?

You will need to demonstrate to the visa officer that you have a solid financial plan in place for your time in Canada. You need to show that you will be able to support yourself without working in Canada, as finding a job during your studies in not guaranteed. Where are the funds for your tuition and living expenses coming from? Are your parents or another family member supporting you? Have you been approved for a bank loan, scholarship, etc. in your home country?

7. Provide details of your education history

You will need to list all of the different schools you have attended up until now. You need to state the start and end dates of your education. Provide the full name and address of each school you have attended. Also state the programs you have completed if you have already completed a college/university program.

You should also explain your work history. List any jobs that you have had, and how these may possibly help you with your studies.

You should end your letter by summarizing your educational goals and reasons why you want to study in Canada. Also, be sure to thank the visa officer for reviewing your application.
